Chile's capital city and financial epicenter is a modern metropolis for sure, but you won't have to go far to be reminded that Mother Nature is a major shareholder. In fact, all you have to do is glance east for an amazing view of the Andes. **Santiago's** central location makes it the ideal gateway to all that Chile has to offer but you'll want make time to explore this stylish city too. It's stuffed with museums, monuments, art galleries, smart boutiques, walking trails, hip coffee houses and even a zoo.



Coquimbo and its twin city La Serena are popular seaside resorts. Enjoy the view a top the 91-meter high "Cross of the Third Millennium". Look for mountain lions, llamas, falcons and the giant Andean Condor.

Iquique got its start with the discovery of sodium nitrate (saltpeter) in the Atacama Desert. Explore the Historic Quarter, Palacio Astoreca and Museo Regional. Shop 'til you drop at the Zona Franca, then hit one of the beautiful beaches.

Arica, the "City of Eternal Spring," is one of northern Chile's up and coming resort destinations. Located at the edge of the Atacama Desert, its year-round sunshine and crisp, breezy air are perfect for water sports of all kinds, and its lush city gardens, fed by the Rio Lluta, make a beautiful setting for shopping and nightlife. Start the day with a windsurfing lesson, sample fresh swordfish by the sparkling harbor, browse Indian handicrafts, or try your luck in the casino nightlife. There's also adventure to be had on day trips into the desert.

Lima, Peru's capital, is the country's cultural hotspot. A bustling, rapidly growing city with a richly layered past, Lima is home to fascinating museums, an enticing array of restaurants and attractive shopping districts. Founded in 1535 as the "City of the Kings," parts of this modern city still retain a colonial charm. Stop by a museum to immerse yourself in the country's fascinating past, stroll through the living history of colonial buildings that are still in use, have an elegant meal and then discover a unique cultural memento to take home.



Salaverry is the gateway to Peru and the port for **Trujillo**, the second largest city in Peru. Located on the northern coast, Trujillo has numerous archaeological sites and it has managed to retain much of its colonial flavor. Like its bigger sister Lima, Trujillo was also founded by the Spanish conquistador Pizarro. For those who have an interest in colonial architecture and design or archeology, the city of Trujillo and beyond holds many highlights.



Located along the Pacific coast of Costa Rica, **Puntarenas** is a great place to see native wildlife ranging from scarlet macaws to the alpha predator of Central America: the jaguar. Surfers from around the world regard this region of Costa Rica as prime surfing waters. As one of the country's leading fishing ports, Puntarenas is the perfect place to enjoy fresh seafood, including ceviche de corvine - bits of fresh fish marinated in lime juice with onions, peppers and spices.

From the people to the bay, sensual **Acapulco** is known for its beauty. Its world-famous beaches offer up the sun and surf for different agendas, whether you're in the mood for exhilaration or serenity.

This once-sleepy fishing village became a popular resort after The Night of the Iguana was filmed here in 1964. Nestled on the 28-mile curve of Banderas Bay, **Puerto Vallarta** has steadfastly held on to its character. Red tile roofs and rows of balconies, spilling over with colorful bougainvillea, still line its cobblestone streets. A pleasure for both the eye and the camera.
